Charles Yang – Language and Linguistics Seminar Series, 4pm, Percy G.05

Charles Yang (University of Pennsylvania), 'What is a Possible Language?'

While there are clearly universal constraints on all languages, actual languages do vary significantly throughout structural domains. A traditional approach to such variation is to invoke general as well as language particular principles to limit a free generative process (e.g., islands vs. Move alpha). I would like to advocate an alternative view: No structure is possible unless it is sufficiently supported by the distributional data. A proper understanding of "sufficient support" allows the language learner to go beyond, while still grounded in, their language particular experience. I will make the case for this approach with several studies of recursive structures and movement constraints across and within languages. This approach recognizes the contingent factors in the history of languages, which place a limit on the orderliness of language and our understanding of it.
